COURSE	DESCRIPTION
BADM 4620 Business Finance 4 semester credits Lecturer: TBA Format: 6-week online course	A course emphasizing financial analysis, budgeting, working capital, short-term and long-term corporate financing, the cost of capital, and the time value of money. Elementary accounting principles will be reviewed. This course includes the biblical concept of stewardship as it relates to wise and ethical finance procedures.
BADM 4640 Legal, Ethical & Regulatory Environment of Business 4 semester credits Lecturer: TBA Format: 6-week online course	A course designed to consider the legal and regulatory environment of business. The common law system, governmental regulations, and rules for non-profit corporations will be explored. Application of moral principles to business with the boundaries of the legal and regulatory environment will be emphasized.
BADM 4670 Business Ethics 4 semester credits Lecturer: TBA Format: 6-week online course	A course integrating personal, social, and professional ethics theories, virtues, and values as a basis for decision making, institutional administration, and professional relationships. This course develops conceptual models for improving the clarity and consistency of ethical judgment in business settings. The impact of cultural diversity and international business settings is considered.
COMM 4611 Business & Professional Communication 4 semester credits Lecturer: TBA Format: 6-week online course	A course teaching practical and theoretical components of effective professional communications. Students will learn foundational skills in effective oral and written communication for the workplace, including development of proposals and presentations. Elements of cross-cultural communications will be included. The course uses Microsoft Word and PowerPoint in various business and professional applications.

CSCI 1000 Introduction to Online Learning Program

1 semester credit
Lecturer: TBA
Format: online course

A course designed to prepare a student to learn in the online e-learning environment. This course will explore the various technologies used in the online delivery system, discuss proven methods for doing successful online work, review all the college policies related to online courses, and demonstrate various research techniques using the college library and other resources available to online students. Students will demonstrate their ability to do online work by completing all assignments successfully.

FLAN 2210, 2120 Elementary Koine Greek

3 semester credits per course.
Lecturer: William D. Mounce, Ph.D.
Formats: Audio/Flash CDs

A year-long sequence introducing elements of Koine Greek morphology, syntax, and vocabulary. Emphasis is on reading New Testament Greek. Cross-listed as RLST 2110, 2120.

HIST 1010 History of Western Civilization to the Reformation

3 Semester Credits
Lecturer: TBA
Format: 6-week online course

A study of Western Civilization from ancient times to 1500 A.D. Among the topics to be discussed are the following: the ancient cultures of Sumer and Egypt, the Assyrians and Babylonians, the history of ancient Israel, the Persian period, Greco-Roman culture and history, the early Christian Church, feudalism and the middle ages, the medieval Church, the Crusades, the Hundred Years War, the War of the Roses, and the Italian Renaissance and the Reformation of the 16th century.

HIST 1020 History of Western Civilization from the Reformation to the Present

3 Semester Credits
Lecturer: TBA
Format: 6-week online course

A study of Western Civilization from the Reformation of the 16th century to the present. Among the topics to be discussed are the following: the scientific revolution, the Age of Discovery, the Enlightenment, the Industrial Revolution, the American Revolution, the French Revolution, nationalism and imperialism, social Darwinism, WWI and WWII, the Great Depression, socialism and communism, Hitler and the Nazis, the Cold War, and the collapse of the Soviet Union.

HIST 2400 History of Christianity

3 semester credits
Lecturer: Garth M. Rosell, Ph.D.
Formats: Audio CDs and MP3s

A survey of the history of the Christian church from the apostolic period to the present, with a focus on intellectual, cultural, political, theological, and institutional developments in the early church, patristic period, medieval church, Reformation, modern era and the contemporary world. Cross-listed as RLST 2400.

HIST 4430 The Ancient Church

3 semester credits
Lecturer: Richard C. Gamble, Dr. Theol.
Formats: Audio CDs and MP3s

A history of the ancient church (Pentecost to AD 500) and a study of key figures and writings of that era. In chronological order, the course covers key theologians in the Patristic Age, including Irenaeus, Origen, Chrysostom, Athanasius, and Augustine, and important councils and creeds. Cross-listed as RLST 4430. Prerequisite: HIST 2400, 3400 or consent of the instructor.

HIST 4435 Augustine and Medieval Theology

3 semester credits

Lecturer: Scott T. Carroll, Ph.D.

Formats: Audio CDs and MP3s

An introduction to St. Augustine: his life, his works, and his legacy in the medieval church. The course details his youth, conversion, literary works, and his important battles against the day's emerging heresies, and his contribution to the development of medieval theology. Cross-listed as RLST 4435. Prerequisite: HIST 2400, 3400 or RLST 2500, 3500 or consent of the instructor.

HIST 4410 History of Christianity to the Protestant Reformation

3 semester credits

Lecturer: Garth M. Rosell, Ph.D.

Formats: Audio CDs and MP3s

In this course, students discover how Christian faith and practice developed from Pentecost to the time of the Protestant Reformation. Lectures focus on the cultural, political, and economic backgrounds of both the Patristic and Medieval periods of church history, and emphasize the contributions of key figures up to the Reformation. The course culminates with the Renaissance, which was the cultural context for Luther's Reformation. Students who complete HIST 2400, HIST 3400 or RLST 2400, RLST 3400 may not enroll in HIST 4410. Cross-listed as RLST 4410.

HIST 4420 History of Christianity from the Protestant Reformation

3 semester credits

Lecturer: Garth M. Rosell, Ph.D.

Formats: Audio CDs and MP3s

In this course, students survey the development of Christian faith and practice from the Protestant Reformation to the present. Lectures focus on the cultural, political, and economic backgrounds of the Reformation, Enlightenment, and Great Awakenings, and emphasize the contributions of key figures of these eras. The course highlights the rise and spread of various traditions, including Lutheranism, Calvinism, Anglicanism, Puritanism, Evangelicalism, and Fundamentalism. Students will also study the nature and trends of modern and postmodern Christianity. Students who complete HIST 2400, HIST 3400 or RLST 2400, RLST 3400 may not enroll in HIST 4420 or RLST 4420. Cross-listed as RLST 4420.

HIST 4430 The Ancient Church

3 semester credits

Lecturer: Richard C. Gamble, Dr. Theol.

Formats: Audio CDs and MP3s

A history of the ancient church (Pentecost to AD 500) and a study of key figures and writings of that era. In chronological order, the course covers key theologians in the Patristic Age, including Irenaeus, Origen, Chrysostom, Athanasius, and Augustine, and important councils and creeds. Cross-listed as RLST 4430. Prerequisite: HIST 2400, 3400 or consent of the instructor.

HIST 4435 Augustine and Medieval Theology

3 semester credits

Lecturer: Scott T. Carroll, Ph.D.

Formats: Audio CDs and MP3s

An introduction to St. Augustine: his life, his works, and his legacy in the medieval church. The course details his youth, conversion, literary works, and his important battles against the day's emerging heresies, and his contribution to the development of medieval theology. Cross-listed as RLST 4435. Prerequisite: HIST 2400, 3400 or RLST 2500, 3500 or consent of the instructor.

HIST 4440 The Protestant Reformation

3 semester credits

Lecturer: W. Robert Godfrey, Ph.D.

Formats: Audio CDs and MP3s

Historical development of the Protestant Reformation from its sixteenth century background and its legacy. The course examines the lives and teachings of the leading Reformers (Luther, Zwingli, Calvin, and Knox) and traces the Reformation movement in various nations. In addition, students study the rise of the major Protestant Movements Lutheranism, Calvinism, Anabaptism, and Puritanism and the Roman Catholic reactions to those movements. Cross-listed as RLST 4440. Prerequisite: HIST 2400, 3400 or consent of the instructor.

HIST 4445 The Theology of Martin Luther

3 semester credits

Lecturer: Robert Kolb, Ph.D.

Formats: Audio CDs and MP3s

A study of the historical background and setting of Luther's thought, as well as his teaching on a range of theological issues, including his understanding of sin and grace, justification and faith, and law and gospel. Cross-listed as RLST 4445. Prerequisite: HIST 2400, 3400 or consent of the instructor.

HIST 4450 The Theology of Jonathan Edwards

3 semester credits

Lecturer: John H. Gerstner, Ph.D.

Formats: Audio CDs and MP3s

Taking a topical approach, this course covers Edwards' teachings on major theological issues, giving particular emphasis to his unique theological contributions. Topics include the place of reason, the decrees of God, the nature of justification, and the extent of sanctification. Cross-listed as RLST 4450. Prerequisite: HIST 2400, 3400 or consent of the instructor.

HIST 4460 Christianity in American History

3 semester credits

Lecturer: John D. Hannah, Ph.D.

Formats: Audio CDs and MP3s

An examination of events, ideas, peoples, and groups that have helped to shape religious life in American from the colonial era to the present, with special attention to the Protestant and Catholic traditions. For Protestantism, the conflict between modernism and fundamentalism is also featured as well as the development of evangelical Christianity in the United States. Cross-listed as RLST 4460. Prerequisite: HIST 2400, 3400 or consent of the instructor.

HIST 4470 A History of Charismatic Movements

3 semester credits

Lecturer: John D. Hannah, Ph.D.

Formats: Audio CDs and MP3s

An historical and theological study of the origins and developments of Classical Pentecostalism, Charismatic Renewalism, and Restoration Movements, with emphasis given to theological backgrounds and trends. Lectures also analyze other related movements, including the "Jesus Only" Movement, the Vineyard Movement, and the Toronto Revival Movement. Cross-listed as RLST 4470. Prerequisite: HIST 2400, 3400 or consent of the instructor.

LEAD 3630 Principles of Leadership

4 semester credits

Lecturer: TBA

Format: 6-week online course

A course to help participants build a theological, theoretical, and practical foundation for becoming effective leaders within an organization. Motivational theory and its application to individual and group productivity is explored. The course will enable the student to evaluate and develop a leadership style.

LEAD 4650 Group & Organizational Behavior

4 semester credits

Lecturer: TBA

Format: 6-week online course

A course designed to study group behavior and how group functioning affects organization effectiveness. Students develop strategies for efficient and productive group and task management. Implications for organization design, job design, and leadership are considered.

LEAD 4660 Strategic Leadership & Management

4 semester credits

Lecturer: TBA

Format: 6-week online course

A course designed to explore strategic leadership through discussion of vision, mission, and values. The course examines how a clear, compelling vision can move individuals and organizations toward desired goals and evaluates strategies that translate vision and mission into action. It further examines the relationship in organizations between planning strategies and their impact on performance and goal attainment.

LEAD 4680 Managing Change and Conflict

4 semester credits

Lecturer: TBA

Format: 6-week online course

A course examining the skills required for effectively leading and managing change within the organization both individually and in groups. The course prepares the student to identify, avoid, or manage common types of conflicts within organizations and presents the communication styles and strategies for working through conflict.

LEAD 4690 Capstone Project

4 semester credits

Lecturer: TBA

Format: 6-week online course

A capstone project designed to provide the student with the opportunity to show an immediate and direct application of principles learned in the Leadership and Organizational Behavior major to the student's work setting. In addition, the project will demonstrate an application of sound biblical/theological principles to a leadership model. In order to facilitate this, the student will be registered for the project at the beginning of the third Leadership and Organizational Behavior course.

PHIL 1020 Introduction to Ethics

3 Semester Credits

Lecturer: TBA

Format: 6-week online course

First section of the course involves a study of major ethical concepts, theories, issues, and history, including the reading of significant primary sources in historical and contemporary ethics. Second section involves application of the concepts, distinctions, and theories learned to several applied ethical issues, including the reading of significant primary sources related to contemporary debates.

PSYC 1010 Introduction to Psychology

3 Semester Credits

Lecturer: TBA

Format: 6-week online course

A study of human behavior. Consideration is given to methodology and concepts in the areas of learning, motivation, emotions, perception, intelligence, and personality.

PSYC 3610 Adult & Professional Development

4 semester credits

Lecturer: TBA

Format: 6-week online course

A course introducing the student to adult development theory to form a cognitive basis for personal analysis and understanding. The student will further be introduced to adult learning theory to equip them to be lifelong learners. Students will be instructed in Prior Learning Assessment and Portfolio Development.

RLST 2200 The Religion and Literature of Ancient Israel

3 semester credits

Lecturer: Douglas Stuart, Ph.D.

Formats: Multi-media DVDs

A study of the Old Testament of the Christian Bible against the historical and cultural backdrop of the Ancient Near East. Special attention is given to the literary genres, development of religious concepts and practices, and the contributions of modern biblical scholarship.

RLST 2300 The New Testament and Christian Origins

3 semester credits

Lecturer: Craig L. Blomberg, Ph.D.

Formats: Multi-media DVDs

A study of the birth of Christianity in the cultural environments of Judaism and the Greco-Roman world. The first half of the course deals with a study of the historical Jesus, emphasizing representative passages from the Synoptic Gospels and John, interacting with modern methods of Gospel criticism. The second half of the course focuses on Acts, the Epistles, and the Apocalypse, paying special attention to critical issues which arise in these areas.

RLST 2400 History of Christianity

Cross-listed as HIST 2400.

RLST 2500 The Christian Tradition

3 semester credits

Lecturer: John M. Frame, D.D.

Formats: Audio CDs and MP3s

A study of the major theological ideas, practices and institutions of Christianity including biblical origins, historical developments and contemporary perspectives. Students are introduced to Eastern Orthodoxy, Roman Catholicism and Protestantism.

RLST 3200 The Religion and Literature of Ancient Israel

Same as RLST 2200 and RLST 2200, with additional requirements. Students who complete RLST 2200 may not enroll in RLST 3200.

RLST 3300 The New Testament and Christian Origins

Same as RLST 2300 and RLST 2300, with additional requirements. Students who complete RLST 2300 may not enroll in RLST 3300.

RLST 3400 History of Christianity

Same as RLST 2400 with additional requirements. Students who complete RLST 2400 may not enroll in RLST 3400. Cross-listed as HIST 3400.

RLST 3500 The Christian Tradition

Same as RLST 2500 with additional requirements. Students who complete RLST 2500 may not enroll in RLST 3500.

RLST 4220 The Pentateuch

2 semester credits

Lecturer: R. Laird Harris, Ph.D.

Formats: Audio CDs and MP3s

An examination of the first five books of the Old Testament in light of contemporary scholarship and archaeological discoveries. Students will also study the Mosaic law and its role in shaping Israel's identity. Pre-requisite: RLST 2200 or 3200, or consent of the instructor.

RLST 4230 The Book of Psalms

2 semester credits

Lecturer: Bruce K. Waltke, Th.D., Ph.D.

Formats: Audio CDs and MP3s

A study of the Book of Psalms, giving attention to the various forms of the Psalms and their function within the historical experience of Israel. The course begins by focusing on the formulation and interpretation of the psalms. Students then examine in detail the various types of psalms: lament, royal, pilgrimage, wisdom, messianic, and psalms of praise. Prerequisite: RLST 2200, 3200 or RLST 5200, 5210 or 5220 or consent of the instructor.

RLST 4240 The Book of Proverbs

2 semester credits

Lecturer: Bruce K. Waltke, Th.D., Ph.D.

Formats: Audio CDs and MP3s

The role of wisdom in the Book of Proverbs and an exegetical study of its contents in their cultural, historical, and literary settings, an analysis of the book's structure and purpose, a study of the forms of wisdom literature as seen in the literary structure of Proverbs, and an analysis of poetry and prominent themes of the book. Prerequisite: RLST 2200, 3200 or RLST 5200, 5210 or 5220 or consent of the instructor.

RLST 4250 The Book of Isaiah

3 semester credits

Lecturer: Allen P. Ross, Ph.D.

Formats: Audio CDs and MP3s

An exegetical study of the Book of Isaiah, including historical background, theological themes, and issues in contemporary Old Testament scholarship. Prerequisite: RLST 2200, 3200 or RLST 5200, 5210 or 5220 or consent of the instructor.

RLST 4260 Old Testament Theology and the New Testament

3 semester credits

Lecturer: Walter C. Kaiser, Jr., Ph.D.

Formats: Audio CDs and MP3s

An exploration of the theology of the Old Testament as understood and appropriated by the writers of the New Testament. The course identifies the focal point for the Old and New Testaments, and includes discussions on continuity and discontinuity between the Testaments, and key topics such as salvation, faith, the people of God, law, worship, atonement, the Kingdom of God, the Messiah, and the New Covenant. Prerequisite: RLST 2200, 3200 or RLST 5200, 5210 or 5220 or consent of the instructor.

RLST 4330 The Parables of Jesus

2 semester credits

Lecturer: Craig L. Blomberg, Ph.D.

Formats: Audio CDs and MP3s

A survey of the parables of Jesus, various approaches to interpretation, the contributions of contemporary New Testament scholarship, and a comparative study of parallel accounts. Prerequisite: RLST 2300, 3300 or RLST 5300, 5310 or 5320 or consent of the instructor.

RLST 4340 The Sermon on the Mount

2 semester credits

Lecturer: John R.W. Stott, D.D.

Formats: Audio CDs and MP3s

An exegetical study of the Sermon as found in Matthew 5-7. Students examine key issues in the Sermon and analyze various interpretations. Prerequisite: RLST 2300, 3300 or RLST 5300, 5310 or 5320 or consent of the instructor.

RLST 4350 The Gospel of Luke

3 semester credits

Lecturer: Darrell L. Bock, Ph.D.

Formats: Audio CDs and MP3s

An analysis of the Gospel of Luke, with a special focus on significant theological themes unique to that Gospel. Prerequisite: RLST 2300, 3300 or RLST 5300, 5310 or 5320 or consent of the instructor.

RLST 4360 The Acts of the Apostles

3 semester credits

Lecturer: Darrell L. Bock, Ph.D.

Formats: Audio CDs and MP3s

An exegetical study of the Book of Acts with a special focus on historical background and theological perspectives in the book. Prerequisite: RLST 2300, 3300 or RLST 5300, 5310 or 5320 or consent of the instructor.

RLST 4370 Epistle to the Romans

3 semester credits

Lecturer: Harold W. Hoehner, Ph.D.

Formats: Audio CDs and MP3s

An exegetical and theological study of Paul's Epistle to the Romans in the Greek text. The course treats select historical, grammatical, structural, and lexical data that illumine the meaning of this New Testament document. Prerequisite: RLST 2110/2111 Elementary Greek, or consent of the instructor.

RLST 4380 The Pastoral Epistles

3 semester credits

Lecturer: John R.W. Stott, D.D.

Formats: Audio CDs and MP3s

An exegetical analysis of these letters and their historical background. Prerequisite: RLST 2110/2111 Elementary Greek, or consent of the instructor.

RLST 4390 New Testament Theology

3 semester credits

Lecturer: Scott J. Hafemann, Dr. Theol.

Formats: Audio CDs and MP3s

A study of the discipline and task of New Testament Theology, exploring issues of biblical theology within Old and New Testament contexts. The lectures discuss the overarching issues of New Testament theology itself: the origin and nature of sin and the Fall, God's sovereignty and human freedom, the law/Gospel contrast, the need for and contours of the New Covenant, and the significance of Christ within the history of Israel. Prerequisite: RLST 2300 or 3400.

RLST 4410 History of Christianity to the Protestant Reformation

Cross-listed as HIST 4410.

RLST 4420 History of Christianity From the Reformation to the Present

Cross-listed as HIST 4420.

RLST 4430 The Ancient Church

Cross-listed as HIST 4430.

RLST 6450 The Theology of Jonathan Edwards

Same as RLST 4450 with additional requirements. Students who complete RLST 4450 may not enroll in RLST 6450. Pre-requisite: RLST 5400 or consent of the instructor.

RLST 6460 Christianity in American History

Same as RLST 4460 with additional requirements. Students who complete RLST 4460 may not take RLST 6460. Pre-requisite: RLST 5400 or consent of the instructor.
